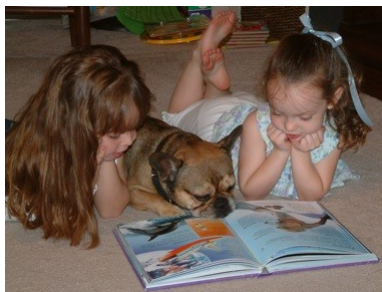
How about a Flea Market/Craft Fair much like the Farmer's Market that we held in the past? Your booth would be the size of a table and the immediate area behind it.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Each Day A Gift

Each month as I compose my President's message, I spend some time thinking about what brings us together here in Meadow Wood Farms. What do we have in common, those of us who have chosen this neighborhood? What do we share?

One of the common themes in almost every connection I have made here is a love of domestic animals. I know of very few households without some kind of companion animal presence, whether it be dogs, cats, birds or horses. I include horses here

because most of us do treat our equine friends more as pets than as farm animals—witness the number of us who have horses grazing in our front yards and casually strolling right up to our doors and windows for a visit! Also, it is very obvious how many of us love animals whenever one is found or goes missing. The whole neighborhood often gets involved in the search and rescue operation! So, I thought the theme for this month's message might be our animals, especially in view of the fact that our March Association guest speaker will be representing Plenty of Pit Bulls Rescue.

I certainly have spoken of my furry family before, notably of the exploits of Lucas the Wandering Coonhound. Today, however, pets are on my mind for a different reason. Within the last four weeks I have lost both my 29-year-old horse, Eldin, and my 15-year-old French Bulldog, Bennie.

Eldin was a noble soul who willingly did everything that

was asked of him, from eventing to field hunting, dressage, trail riding and husband-toting. In his later years, he was the perfect example of the pasture ornament: handsome, sensible, and an easy keeper! Although he was not mine until 2008, I knew and admired him for a dozen years before that. I feel very privileged to have had him in my barn for the last years of his life.

Bennie came into our household at ten weeks old, all ears and attitude, and reigned supreme ever since. He brought immeasurable joy and laughter into my life. We won obedience titles together, got expelled from Agility classes together, and acted in Murder Mystery theater groups together. He was one of a kind, a clown and a healer, a boisterous pest and a cuddly snuggler.

So why do they mean so much, these animal companions? Why do we miss

them so when they leave us? What do they bring to our lives, anyway? A recent study in Budapest revealed that there is an area in the dog's brain that responds specifically to human emotion as revealed in our voice. They detect and understand the difference between a happy human and a sad one. This seems to be the explanation why so many people swear that their dog knows when they need to be comforted. Numerous studies have also shown that hypertension and other stress-related conditions can be positively affected by interaction with companion animals. Caring for a pet results in other positive health outcomes as well, like getting more exercise and keeping a regular schedule.

Me, I think it's all about giving. Each day with your pet (or your horse) is a pure gift from them to you. These gifts may not always be desired (reference Lucas the Coonhound) but they are offered

MWF Roads Status Report – Jim Bain

The wheels continue to turn on our road project. The plans were completed in mid-February and have been put out for bid. I will be attending the pre-bid meeting, hopefully in the next couple of weeks. The county expects to receive those bids in late March. Given the requirement for the Board of Commissioners to schedule a public hearing and give 30 days notice, we expect that hearing to take place in late April. Also, the county has agreed to participate in a Partnering Session, something they rarely do. It's a team building and mutual goal setting session for representatives from all of the key stakeholders in the project. This group would include Marion County, the engineering firm, the contractor, any major sub-contractors, and of course, MWF.

Share The Road Safely— Dave Kane



I just about collected a bicycle and rider with my truck the other day. By collected, I mean my front bumper and his left side. My trucks eight lugnuts' trumped his one. I wouldn't have gotten a scratch, but the rider? WOW, we both would have had bad days, his far worse. It didn't happen, simply because I noticed the rider start to lean toward my lane and I was able to stop before he got there. We were lucky that day.

He could have prevented even the slightest chance of this happening, if he had done one simple thing. It's easy and bike riders are not the only ones who do not do it. Just signal your intention to turn, or change a lane. If the bike rider cannot ride on two wheels with just one hand for the short time it takes to signal his intention, then he

needs a tricycle.

On the other hand, how many of you have seen drivers who forgot to order the turn signal option on their cars? Maybe your car came without them as well. I do find it amazing the number of cars here without them, or the drivers that don't know where they are in the car. Oh, they can chat on the phone and drive, but to flip that little lever up or down? Can't do it! Not enough hands I guess.

We need to take a minute and make sure our young bike riders know the proper hand signals for a turn or stop, while out on their bikes. Especially if they are riding around in traffic. Plus, we should make sure we are using our signals to let other drivers know our own intentions. Also we should remind our young drivers that a turn signal, when used, does not give you the right of way.

So stay extra vigilant out there for those other drivers. We want you to stay safe and to see you at our MWFPOA meetings and functions.



What will it take? —Dave Kane

What did, or will, it take to get you to be better prepared for a disaster? Did you need to get stuck in a blizzard for several days? Have your power go out due to summer storms and tornados? Have Mount St. Helens blow its top and make travel near impossible? Get called out in the middle of the night to a major crime scene or tactical call-out and be away from home for several days in the middle of nowhere?

Oh wait, those were all me! But they all have one thing in common; extended times without the normal comforts we have become used to in day to day living. They all helped me to be better prepared for a disaster. Keeping that emergency kit and bag ready to go at any time you might need it. Thinking and planning ahead are the keys to success.

Sometimes you have the luxury of time to plan for an emergency, but often you do not. So now is the perfect time to start planning ahead. Take a few minutes and think about what you would do if a storm has caused a power outage in your home. Now what do you do? Since the length of the outage can vary from a few hours to several days, you should plan to get by without utilities for at least three days.

One thing we can do is use FEMA's "[Going Off Grid: Utility Outages](#)," free, online activity module to reference simple steps to help get prepared for an outage. This module also provides a food safety reference chart so you can know when to save food or when to discard it. Some utility outage checklist items include:

- Document important phone numbers and vital power company information;
- Locate and label your utility shutoffs; and **Have your [disaster kit](#) ready and stocked.**
- The "Going Off Grid: Utility Outages" activity module is part of FEMA's "[Preparedness Activities for Communities Everywhere](#)" tools, which educate individuals about relatively easy steps to take to become prepared for all types of hazards. The tools are designed for anyone to use in coordination with local emergency preparedness partners to help better prepare for emergencies. Starting on **Monday, March 3rd. at 2 p.m.** We will meet with Letty Towles at Friendship Park in Meadow Wood Farms.

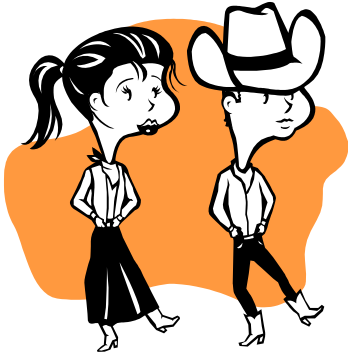
If you are interested in joining the class, please email me your name, address and phone number. I'll also need your dog's name, breed, color, sex and age.

Night came and some nice ladies brought us food and water. It was very different here, cement floors and block walls. Different sounds, different smells and the awareness that there were others like us sharing close quarters. Night became day and the days became the same. The nice ladies would feed us breakfast and take us out to the "play yard" for fun and exercise. We got used to our new place and we would play and romp around and the nice ladies would laugh at our antics. Days turned into months and we grew bigger and became even more competitive for food and space! While outside one sunny day I looked over and saw one of the nice ladies sitting on a step laughing as we played. I decided I would sit down beside her, and I sort of leaned up against her! She smiled and put her arm around me and said, "You're my little Buster aren't you?" It felt good to have her arm around me and hear her say kind words just for me.

A few days later the nice ladies came in crying. I had no idea what could possibly make such caring and kind ladies cry. But then, one by one, six of my brothers and sisters were taken away. Only my little red haired sister and I remained. Now we really were afraid! It felt completely strange, just the two of us. Where would they have taken the others and what was going to happen to us? It was a very long night and we cried and cried and cried. When the sun came up the next day I heard the soft voice of the lady that called me Buster. She told me that she was taking me home to live with her and that I did not have to be afraid. She held me in her arms and carried me to her truck. All the way to my new home she spoke in that same soft voice, comforting me and telling me how much I will be loved.

So here I am, a year older, happy and full of spirit. I am loving every day in my new home. I have a great mom and dad, a new sister Lucy and brother Rosco. There are two creeks to splash around in and lots of tall grass to hide from Mom in. I get treats when I'm good and there is plenty of food for everyone. I am grateful that I was adopted and have put those days at the city animal shelter behind me. I have not forgotten the nice ladies that cared so much for all of us creatures during our stay. Mom says I'm very special and will always be. I believe that to be true. But even more special are those who have the heart to care and love all dogs and cats though they may not be pedigree or the most beautiful or perfect of beasts. Like me, these animals feel the love and hear the kindness in the words of these good people and only want to please them. My heart will always be filled with love and respect for all the wonderful people who have made a place in their hearts and homes for the creatures like my little red haired sister and me.

Sometimes when I am playing, I don't come the first time my mom calls me. I know that it makes her worry but I would never run away! I will be her "Buster Brown" and she will be my mom forever. I'll just sit down beside her and lean on her a little and know I'm a "lucky dog"!

I actually volunteered at the Waverly Animal Shelter and served as the Humphries County Humane Society President for two years while we lived in Tennessee. The experience was difficult but rewarding when these very special "shelter" cats and dogs were adopted into their "forever" homes. Keep these precious critters in mind when you consider a new pet.
