Your Neighbors Are Your Best Protection!



This was the main point brought to us by Detective Evans and Deputy Lockhart of the Dunnellon District Office of the Sheriff's Department. Both officers were guest speakers at our March Association meeting. There are no official "Neighborhood Watch" programs anymore, but they emphasized that your neighbors have a better idea if there is suspicious activity in your area than they do. They encouraged us to call in on the non-emergency phone number of 732-9111 anytime that something doesn't look right. Of course, if you know it's an emergency call 911, but they prefer we don't clog that line if it is just suspicious.

Other helpful suggestions:

Keep your cars and doors locked and if you have an automatic start the engine fob, make sure you check, that when you leave your car, it isn't still running and unlocked. One of the residents present, who shall remain nameless, proved that very point for us. Yep, as they were leaving, the detective came back in and asked who owned a Buick. You could hear a pin drop, until we realized that he was talking about an uninhabited car with its engine running. You can't make this up. There were a number of unintentional humorous moments at the meeting. It's worth coming just for the laughs.

Never leave keys or firearms in an unlocked car. Detective Evans really hates this kind of carelessness. Can't do this in this day and age folks.

Security Cameras are a big help to them. He especially liked the ones that respond to the doorbell being rung. Apparently, most burglaries are committed during the day. He assured us that most day robbers will avoid places with alarm systems, dogs, or anything that might be problematic. There are a variety of camera systems at varying prices. Some will alert your cell phone with movement or the doorbell and most will capture an image that helps with the apprehension of the crook.

Their MCSO facebook page is a huge source of information.

Beware of Scams. If someone offers you something for free, it's generally not. The IRS does not call you threatening to arrest you if you don't pay up, they will audit you first.....and call your relative, who is unlikely to be stranded in some exotic locale, before you send money.

The volunteer program, called COPS includes trained persons, who will cruise neighborhoods, but not one specifically or by request. The president has application forms, if you're interested.

Generally, we are considered to be a safe neighborhood, but it never hurts to keep aware. [Another good reason to know your neighbors.](#)

Companion Animals – Joy and Heartache

Most MWF residents choose to share their lives with one or more domestic animals. For the vast majority, these companion animals are loved family members and cared for with the same commitment and responsibility as children – one does wonder why they are not tax deductible dependents!

The community association has now re-established a control committee and this may be an appropriate time to review the “control” we are expected to exercise regarding these companion animals. Marion County ordinances state that an animal must be kept under direct human control. This means confined within a house, building, fence, or other enclosure – or leashed at any time it is not so confined. Additionally, the ordinance addresses domestic animals that create a “nuisance”, such as chasing vehicles, bikes, people, or other animals, disturbing trash/garbage containers, etc. The complete ordinance is available online – it is Chapter 4 of the County Code. And while neutering is not a legal issue, failure to do so with dogs and cats only ensures an ever growing population of homeless animals. About 35% of American households do not neuter their pets, resulting in millions of unwanted puppies and kittens annually. There are low cost neuter programs available in Marion County – call me if you need information.

I’m always impressed with the care and concern shown by 99% of our residents – and the assistance they constantly offer. The few who do not keep their animals safely confined and “under control” present a risk for the animal, but also for human residents. Your dog may be friendly and lovable at home, but a moving bike, truck, horse, or dog on a leash is often a temptation not to be ignored. The results may be mildly inconvenient to downright devastating. Outdoor cats are a target for predators – and they certainly practice their own predation on our songbird population.

So while I am imploring the few to be truly responsible owners, I also must express endless gratitude to the majority in Meadow Wood Farms who already are. Some of you very special people have stretched your household population by “adopting a foundling” from me and providing a loving home. As the kids would say, “that is awesome”. Please make new neighbors aware of the Pet Safety Committee and encourage them to join the Neighborhood Association, attend meetings, read the newsletter, and access the community email.

By the way, I am aware that, despite best efforts and intent, there are some dogs/cats that could escape a high security federal penitentiary (I own one such Jack Russell). If and when that happens, having your pet wear a tag with your name and address may save its life.

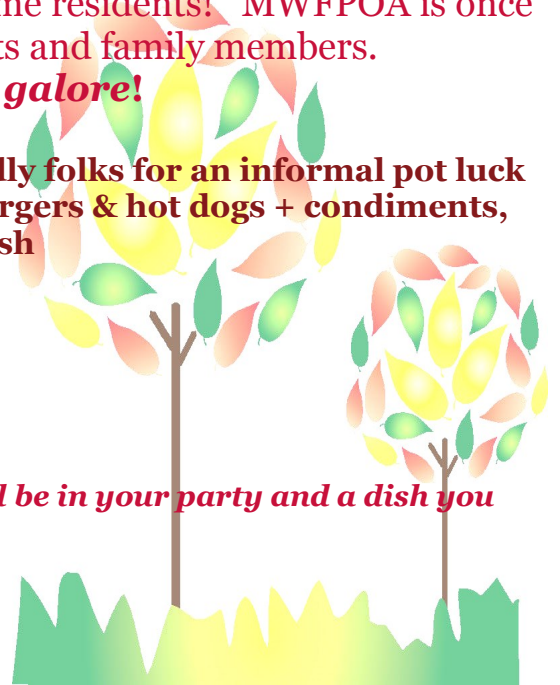

Control Committee Mission Statement

Bob Coveney and a group of eight residents met several times to re-organize, rethink and create a process for the control committee going forward. They came up with a mission statement and some clear guidelines as well as a form for notice of a violation of the Deed Restriction Bylaws. Four members of the group have also volunteered to serve on the committee. This is a huge accomplishment and is much appreciated by all residents. A big thanks to Leslie Pope-Hall, Bob Seymour, Zach Zachary, David Wagner, Bill Atkins, Elaine Hager, Tom Corrow, Mark Chapdelaine and, of course, Bob Coveney. The new committee will be Zach Zachary, Bill Atkins, Tom Corrow, and Elaine Hager will be the alternate.

Consistent with the Deed Restrictions and Bylaws of Meadow Wood Farms, the Control Committee shall strive to:

- A) Preserve the character of the neighborhood.
- B) Protect property values.
- C) Safeguard the continued use and enjoyment of all residents while ensuring that no property owner adversely affects another owner's use or enjoyment of their property.

With those overall goals in mind, the Control Committee shall faithfully execute the following:

- 1) Serve as arbiter for the discretionary items contained within the Deed Restrictions.
- 2) Actively investigate potential violations of the Deed Restrictions as properly reported by any Meadow Wood Farms owner and attempt to negotiate a mutually acceptable solution with the homeowner involved.
- 3) Maintain a vigil regarding construction, maintenance and replacement of all frontal fencing. Courteously address property owners regarding all fencing matters, and adhere to Deed Restriction deadlines regarding approval/disapproval of fencing plans.
- 4) Engage in outreach and education so all MWF homeowners are aware of the requirements of the Deed Restrictions.
- 5) Maintain a record of all Committee activities and report those activities to the Executive Board in a timely manner.

You can contact one of the Control Committee if you have an issue and obtain a form for the notice of a violation.

The Committee will not address anonymous complaints.

Reminder to all residents: It is not legal for property owners to put anything in the 15' right of way between the roads and your fence or property line. It's entirely likely that should something happen because of any obstruction, the perpetrator of the obstruction would be liable. UH, OH. 🤔

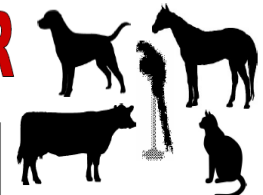

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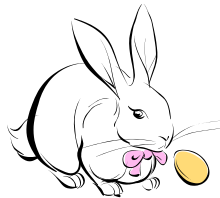

Faith & George Moran— Jodie and Sandy

George started his hobby of raising competitive pigeons at the age of 9. "What made you think of doing that?", I asked. "Because I wasn't allowed to." he answered. His parents were not enthusiastic about pigeons, so the older boys across the street helped him hide the first birds he found in their barn. With the help of the Polish breeders in town, who had brought a variety of special birds with them from the "old country", George became addicted and has since worked and shown competitively with people from all over the country. None of them, though, have the expertise of those old timers, he claims.

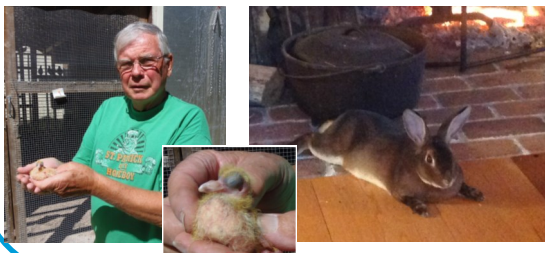
George specializes in Roller Pigeons. These beautiful birds come in a variety of colors, but they are most unusual for the way they spin backwards while in flight. George says they will violently roll backwards in a tight ball the size of a donut at the extraordinary speed of 7 revolutions per second, faster than the eye can catch. He showed us one bird that had a scooped tail that was highly prized. The tail acts as a kind of rudder and that shape enhances the speed of the spin. Rollers originated in Birmingham, England in the 1870's and first came to the USA in the late 1800's. Both parents feed the young, because both have pigeon milk. The male will also sit on the egg from 9am-4pm and then the hen takes over. (I can imagine what all you human mothers are thinking.)

The birds are trained in groups of 20-30. However, you are only allowed 20 or less in competition. With 5 minutes to get themselves organized, they must fly continuously for 15 minutes and are judged by the depth and velocity of the spin, among other technicalities, in order to get the highest points and win. If some of the birds come in early, you lose points or are even disqualified. Sandy and I got a chance to see the birds in training while we were there. They fly in a tight group, gaining altitude as they circle. They are capable of getting higher than the clouds, but seem to get nervous, when visibility is less clear. George says they tend to spin mostly when it is overcast, especially with a slight drizzle. No one knows why they do this and the birds aren't talking. I was a nervous wreck while they were above us. I scanned the sky for hawks as much as I watched the pigeons. The Morans have, indeed, lost a few of their charges to the high flying local predators. Apparently, the best time to train is the afternoon, when the hawks have already eaten and fed their young.



The Morans moved here about 14 months ago from Ashford, CT. "I'm from CT", I told them. It's a small state and we found out just how small, when we discovered that Faith's grandparents owned a farm 5 minutes from the house where I grew up on the same country road. Her cousin was visiting my brother in FL, as we were speaking, and my niece's husband is also a relative of hers by marriage, so that makes us..... are you serious???! Since Faith has 8 brothers and sisters, it was inevitable that we would know or have relatives in common from such a small town. I love it. You never know what you're going to discover in these interviews.

"How did you meet?" asked Sandy (the romantic). You're going to love this. It turns out Faith had lost her husband and after a year her friends decided it was time she needed to find someone. They took out an ad (the original online dating service), describing a country girl who doesn't smoke or drink and added her first name and phone number only. George, as we have learned, likes a challenge. He went through the entire phone book in the town, until he matched the phone number to the name Faith, finding a last name and address. After calling Faith for a later meet and greet in town, he decided to check out the address and saw a lovely farm nestled in a valley. Hmmn. Good so far. As he drove up the road past the house, he noticed a white bronco going in the opposite direction. He found out later, that in the bronco were Faith and her friends heading out to check on George's place. These two were meant to be, don't you think? When they finally got together, George was impressed enough to give up smoking and drinking. The clincher was that this was a woman who also loved critters. Faith eventually had a few pigeons of her own and they also have a mini-Rex rabbit living with them.



There's a lot more to this couple than we could fit in here.

We hope you get a chance to meet them as we did.
