

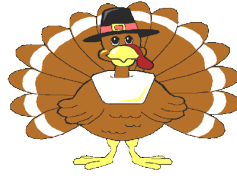
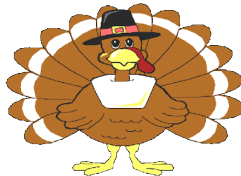
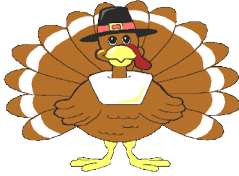

Recycle Your Aluminum Cans



A Portion to Benefit MWFPOA Treasury

Before the trial of OJ Simpson, there was another Crime of the Century. This was the shooting death of William Woodward, Jr., the owner of Nashua and the famed Belair Stud.

In the fall of 1955, a string of burglaries occurred in the Woodward's neighborhood. Late one night, allegedly believing she heard a burglar, Ann Woodward fired her shotgun twice, killing her husband. Though the question remains whether it was an accident or murder, a grand jury did not indict her. After Billy's death, the door to society slammed shut for Ann.

Her mother in law, who had never cared for Ann, closed down Belair Stud and forced the sale of Champion Nashua to Spendthrift Farm for \$1,251,200.

In 1975, Truman Capote published a thinly veiled account of the Woodward's story, *Answered Prayers*, which accused Ann of outright murder. With the past dug up for all to see, Ann Woodward killed herself by taking a cyanide pill that same year.

Owned by [William Woodward, Jr.'s](#) famous [Belair Stud](#) in [Bowie, Maryland](#), Nashua was trained by [Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons](#) and ridden by [jockey Eddie Arcaro](#). As a two-year-old in 1954, Nashua entered eight races, winning six and finishing second twice, which earned him champion 2-year-old honors. The following year he earned [United States Horse of the Year](#) awards from the Thoroughbred Racing Association (with 21 of the 40 votes),^[1] and the publishers of [Daily Racing Form](#).^[2]

Nashua won his famous match race with the great thoroughbred [Swaps](#), who had defeated him in the 1955 [Kentucky Derby](#).

Retirement

At the end of his 1956 season, after thirty career races with a record of 22–4–1, Nashua was retired to stand at stud at [Spendthrift Farm](#) in [Lexington, Kentucky](#). He retired as only the second horse to earn more than \$1 million. His earnings of \$1,288,565 surpassed the great [Citation's](#) record and stood as the earnings mark until surpassed by [Round Table](#) in the autumn of 1958.

Saturday, September 29 was a hot and humid day, even at 8:00 am, but that did not deter the intrepid group of Meadow Wood Memory Walkers defending their title as Top Fundraising Team in the 2018 Walk to End Alzheimer's! Fortified by a complimentary smoothie at the Pacesetters Tent reserved for last year's top teams, the following 11 individuals completed either the short or long version of the Walk, surrounded by thousands of fellow activists representing Alzheimer's patients and caregivers. We all carried brightly colored pinwheel flowers in blue (Alzheimer's patient), yellow (caregiver), purple (someone who has lost a loved one to Alzheimer's) or orange (general supporter). At the end of the Walk, the flowers were planted in a huge spinning garden representing all of those dedicated to finding a treatment, cure, or vaccine.

Going into the Walk that day, the Memory Walkers were in undisputed FIRST PLACE, with well over \$10,000 in donations. However, since fundraising technically continues until December 31st, the "End Alz Now" Team has barely scraped out a small lead, due to their very successful End Alzheimer's Trail Ride last weekend at the Florida Horse Park. Currently they stand at a mere **\$196** ahead of us...(hint, hint).

Friendly rivalry aside, however, the 2018 Ocala Walk raised a total of \$114,000 to fund research, education and direct caregiver support for Alzheimer's patients. We are getting closer to a cure, I just know it... and this team and our donors are getting us there.

Thanks to all Team Members and to all who donated. We'll do it again next year!

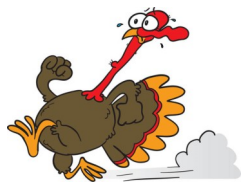
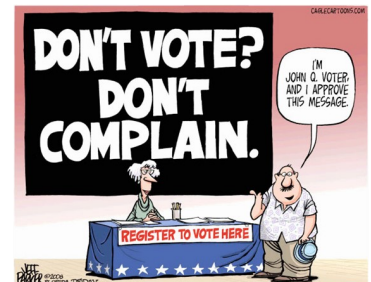

Korea Revisited Dave Kane

Recently I had the honor of accompanying my Dad, Don Kane, back to Korea. You see, Dad is a Korean War Vet and the picture on the left above is him in 1953 shortly after he got to Korea and his duty assignment in the Mundun-ni Valley. There he provided artillery support for the battles around Heartbreak Ridge and Bloody Ridge among others during the war. The picture on the right was September of 2018 standing on an observation deck overlooking the same valley with North Korea in the background. It was a very emotional and bonding experience for both of us.

South Korea has a program where they pay half of a Korea War Veterans expenses to come back (revisit) to South Korea so they can thank them for saving their country and honor them with an Ambassador of Peace Medal. They also pay about 1/3 of a traveling companions expenses. I got to be Dad's traveling companion and I'm really glad I was able to do so. These tours last about 5 days and take place 2-3 times a year. Korea works with an American company called *Military Historical Tours, Inc.* (miltours.com) to make it happen.

From the moment we landed in Seoul we knew we were "honored" guests. There were signs at the airport welcoming "KOREAN WAR VETERANS – You will always be our Heroes!". The hotel lobby had the same signs as did our rooms and the buses they transported us on. The police escorted the buses to all the venues so there would be no traffic delays.

While there were 128 people as part of this "Revisit", only about 50 of them were Veterans. The rest were companions or family members of those who had fought in the War but were no longer alive. One lady on our bus lost her brother during the War and was returning to honor him. As part of the program we went to the DMZ and Panmunjom, and actually got to step into North Korea! We experienced Korean culture, went to the Seoul National Cemetery, the War Memorial of Korea where America is honored and recognized for our contribution to the Korean War and the saving of Korea.

We also visited the Changdeokgung Palace and were able to do some shopping. As an interesting side note; as Dad and I were walking through one of the department stores I spotted a sign that said "Sports" hanging over a clothing section. The only "sports" related item I noticed was on a mannequin and it was a Florida Gators sweatshirt!

During our tour of the DMZ we visited one of the Outposts along the Southern Military Demarcation Line. This outpost is manned by units from the 3rd Infantry Division of the Korean Army. They are known as the "White Skulls" and their motto is they pledge to fight to keep South Korea free until their skulls turn white.

They wanted to give us a briefing outlining their history and duties. The outpost building was a two-story affair without an elevator and the briefing room and observatory was on the second floor. Their Lt. Colonel noticed we had several Veterans in wheel chairs and others with walkers or canes who could not make the climb up the stairs. He had his soldiers carry the Veterans in their chairs up the stairs and had a soldier escort all of the other Veterans to avoid any injuries. The process was repeated after the briefing.

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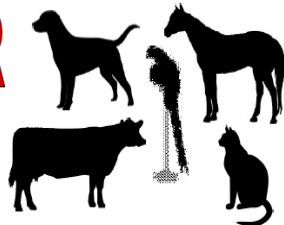

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Out & About

If you have ever watched an episode of the mid 90's TV series *Friends*, you probably remember those funny and adorable young adults hanging around Central Perk, their favorite coffee shop. Back in the 60's (you remember them don't you?) coffee shops were meeting places and a venue for local folk entertainment, beatniks, and hippies. Coffee shops have been around for years and are likely to be around for years to come. They have changed over the years and proliferated with the likes of Starbucks and Peets. Even Dunkin Donuts has gotten into the act. With that as background and after a chance visit to a local coffee shop, I thought it might be fun to sample and rate the coffee shops that are out and about in Ocala.

After a quick Google search, I found the expected Starbucks with approximately 342 locations within 10 miles of MWF. OK, I'm exaggerating but there **are** a lot them. There are multiple Dunkin Donuts, a few Panera Bread locations, and at least three shops that are locally owned and operated; Sips (on Easy St. near the movie theatre), Symmetry (downtown on Magnolia), and Cup-o-the-Irish (southeast on Maricamp Road). For the purposes of this article, I visited a couple of Starbucks, one Dunkin Donuts, one Panera, and each of the local establishments. As I do informally with any restaurant, I used a rating system which includes, in no order of importance, Atmosphere, Noise Level, Food Quality (particularly coffee in this case), Service, and Value. With an admitted prejudice against chain stores of any kind and a fondness for locally owned businesses, I humbly offer my ratings.

***** Sips: With a score of 24 of 25 possible points, I consider Sips to be the best coffee shop in town. A true coffee shop, its almost perfect score represents a quiet, peaceful, and eclectic décor, excellent food, and the best coffee in town. Given that we used to be able to buy a cup of coffee for 25 cents, I find it hard to give any coffee shop that charges \$5 for a cup of coffee a perfect value score. That said, their pricing is fair and a good value for the total experience. Finally, instead of a "rewards" card for multiple visits, they offer the own Sips Family card. As Jose, the owner, said to us, "welcome to the Sips family."

**** Symmetry: As a straight up coffee shop they are neck and neck with Sips. They also serve crepes which are among my favorites. Again, a quiet atmosphere, this is a place I would choose for a brief downtown business meeting, or just a get together with a couple of friends. Wi-fi enabled as most coffee shops are, this would also be a great place to surf the net and get a little work done in a peaceful yet active environment. Their only downside is that the staff behind the counter was less than enthusiastically friendly.

**** Cup-o-the-Irish: Close behind Sips, Cup-o-the-Irish scored well in every category. The best feature was their food. The noise level was low encouraging conversation although because it also serves beer and wine and morphs into more of an Irish bar in the evenings, I would guess that the noise can get oppressive. In short, I would go back for their food but be unlikely to travel across town for a cup of coffee. If you are in the area however, it's worth the stop for a cup of java or a nice lunch.

*** Panera: Among the corporate shops, with Starbucks and Dunkin, you know it when you walk in. It doesn't feel anywhere near as homey and welcoming as the locally owned shops. The noise level can get a bit higher as the shops are generally larger and the service can vary from friendly and helpful to almost surly and inattentive. The food is good and the coffee is better than average. As with any chain, the big benefit is the consistency of the food and beverage offerings. You know what you are getting when you order.

*** Starbucks: If you drink coffee, you have surely been to a Starbucks. Downsides include the corporate feel and the value received. As a friend of mine once said, "Starbucks is the only place that you can pay \$6-8 for a 3000 calorie cup of coffee." Its upside is the attitude and cheeriness of its wait staff. It too is a place to go to meet friends or business associates and stores are everywhere, which does offer some convenience. The food is microwaved and below average as a result and was rated accordingly.

* Dunkin Donuts: Obviously there are people out there who love DD or the franchise would not have lasted this long. In a comparison of coffee shops, they land firmly at the bottom. DD shares the corporate sort of atmosphere and makes no attempt to make their stores warm or friendly. Actually, it feels somewhat antiseptic. Their coffee is among the worst I've ever had. McDonalds coffee may be worse but they're not a coffee shop. If on the other hand, you have a hankering for dessert for breakfast, this is the only place we visited that offers multiple varieties of glazed, sugar coated, cream filled, chocolate covered creations called donuts. Let's just say it's not exactly health food. While I have a sweet tooth to rival anyone's, I still have a little trouble paying that much for a donut which is likely to put me into a sugar coma. Needless to say, DD did not score well for value.

There you have my 2 cents on the coffee shops in and around Ocala. So, if you are looking to get out of the house for a pleasant visit and some good coffee, take your pick. You won't regret being Out & About.
